n New Years Eve, 1987, Jimmy Buffett was joined by Steve Winwood at The Margaritaville Gafe. Midnight came and went as the somewhat more than boisterous crowd reveled in live performances of the classic Steve Winwood / Spencer Davis hit "Gimme Some Lovin ' to the present "Back In The High Life." Only at Margaritaville could the clock be stopped to complete a set; our midnight countdown occured at about 12:15. All the Margaritians agreed; this was going to be a tough night to beat.

some pretty impressive circles year round. This was no more evident than several weeks later when JB was joined on the Margaritaville stage by a virtual who's who of rock 'n roll. Rock luminaries including Steve Gropper, Donald "Duck" Dunn, Russ Kunkel, Hugh McKraken, The Memphis Homs; Wayne Jackson & Andrew Love, and of course, Mr. Utley, gave new meaning to the phrase "enjoy yourself." To try and list all of their accomplishments within the confines of a monthly Telegraph would be a disservice. However, a brief synopsis of their respective careers is called for. Steve Cropper,

a well known songwriter, producer, and legendary guitarist. He collaborated with Wilson Pickett (Midnight Hour), and Otis Redding (Sittin' on the Dock of the Bay), and was the featured guitarist on Rod Stewarts' "Atlantic Crossing" LP. Donald "Duck" Dunn, irrevocably linked with "The Blues Brothers," is nonetheless a premier bass player in his own right. This particular night was also a reunion for Steve Cropper and "Duck" Dunn, who can trace their musical relationship back to a high school band; The "Mar-Keys". They continued from

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in Memphis, and later joined Booker T. Jones and Al Jackson to form the renown blues group "Booker T. and the M.G.'s." Wayne Jackson of The

Wayne Jackson of The Memphis Horns has a musical history dating back to Elvis Presley, but is now probably best known for his stirring trumpet solo during "Margaritaville," which brought the crowd to its feet and knocked Jimmy off his. Hugh McKraken, (who was recording in Fort Lauderdale, and would've been steamed if no one had called him) is perhaps best known as a jazz guitarist associating with the likes of Tom Scott, Eric Gale, and Richard Tee.



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

Michael Utleys' association with Jimmy began with JB's first ABC-Dunhill album, "White Sport Coat and A Pink Crustacean." Since that time he has played on and / or produced many of Jimmys' albums. He continues to produce his own albums ("Mad Music" & "Jubilee" with Robert Greenidge) and is currently working with "Fingers" Taylor on his upcoming release. Michael most recently pro-duced the HBO special, "Roy Orbison, A Black & White Night" on HBO's acclaimed Session Series. Also appearing were Bruce Springsteen, Jackson Browne, J.D. Souther, Tom Waits, and many others.

Many of us more appreciative rock fans applauded

the performances of such classics as "Green Onions,"
"Hip Huggers," "Mustang
Sally," "Knock on Wood," and
the above mentioned "Midnight Hour" and "Dock of the Bay." But this was a Buffett crowd. As Jimmy led the band into a Buffett set, tables and chairs were a thing of the past. It was difficult to tell who was having a better time, the band or the crowd. Steve Cropper was quoted later as "not having this much fun in 15 years." A rousing encore brought the band back for one more song the Van Morrison classic, "Brown Eyed Girl." This quickly turned into a singalong even with this crowd the lyrics were not too difficult: Sha-la-la-la-la-la-la-la-lala-la-ti-da.
