
Buffett, Paxson's favorite musical performer.

## o other Harley riders like the same music that you enjoy?

The answer lies in a computerized compact disc juke box that accompanied the **Harley-Davidson** demoridefleet around the country throughout 1992.

The platter-spinning music maker holds 100 CD's, which amounts to roughly 12,000 tunes. The amazing thing about it is its' memory: it can tell you how many times a certain song or disc was played. Each time a selection is made, it is individually counted as a single, and applied toward the totals of its' album.

Of 5,400 songs played by 17,000 demo riders during 1992 (about 300 hours of music), from San Francisco to Daytona Beach, the top artist was easily Jimmy Buffett. Buffett, with three hits in the top ten, was also the only artist with more than one hit.


#### Hey! Watch That Staple!

### JIMMY BUFFETT

## poetic picnic

e first saw Jimmy Buffett a few years ago in Key West. He had just moved there from Nashville and was playing for beers in a Duval Street bar, having a very good time of it. Green Label foam laced his walrus mustache, there was an illegal gleam in his eye and he was tenderly crooning a last-call lament - "Honey, why don't we get drunk and screw?" - which last year (1973) became the B side of his first hit single, *The Great Filling Station Holdup*, and has since been wore to raw grooves on every roadhouse jukebox between Wheeling and Bakersfield.

The Hype Machine has taken to calling him "the new Jim Croce" particularly after the success of his first two [Dunhill] albums, A White Sport Coat and a Pink Crustacean and Living and Dying in 3/4 Time - but he's better than that. He is what you would call an original. His songs are special stories. Some are outrageous Fabulous Furry Freak Brothers romps on such themes as shoplifting (Who's gonna steal the peanut butter / I'll get a can of sardines / Runin' up and down the aisle of the Mini Mart / Stickin' food in our jeans), but others come dangerously near being poetry. On He Went to Paris, he sings, with sad sunshine in his voice, "But the warm summer breezes / The French wines and cheeses / Put his ambition at bay / And summers and winters / Scattered like splinters / And four or five years slipped away." He's just finished songs for the soundtrack of Rancho Deluxe, scripted by his Key West buddy, novelist Tom McGuane, and a third album, A1A, is just out. He wrote the final verse of one cut, Life Is Just a Tire Swing, after rolling a rent-a-car onto an Illinois lawn that had a swing hanging there, and came up with another, My Whole World Lies Waitin' Behind Door Number Three, one Sunday afternoon when he and Steve Goodman were drinking out the cobwebs and discovered a mutual unbridled love for Monty Hall. Jimmy writes about pieces of America that most of us can see but never stop to notice - and he just keeps getting better.


"We are a group of Parrot Heads that do research in biochemistry at Brookhaven
National Laboratory. We wanted to let you know that your



not all that many years ago, when a ship running aground in the Keys wasn't considered a tragedy, but a boom to the local economy.

"Wreck Ashore," was the cry that sent hearts racing and men scrambling to reach the distressed ship first.

Salvaging shipwrecks, or "wrecking" as it was once commonly called, was the Keys first major industry, and helped make Key West, for a short time, the wealthiest city in the United States.

Although Indians were undoubtedly the first Keys inhabitants to profit from shipwrecks, wrecking as a legally sanctioned enterprise didn't begin in the Keys until the early 1800's, soon after Spain ceded Florida to the United States, and wreckers from other parts of the country began migrating to Key West. Prior to 1819, most wreckers (and pirates) working these waters were based in the Bahamas and Cuba.

Several factors contributed to Key West's rise as a wrecking center. In 1822, the United States sent Commodore David Porter to Key West to establish a Navy base and rid the Caribbean of pirates. That same year, Key West was declared a port of entry.

In 1825, Congress pased a law making it illegal for vessels to transport ships or goods salvaged from Florida waters to a foreign port. Three years later, the U.S. established an admirality court in Key West and began issuing licenses to wrecking vessels.

At the time, wreckers were still regarded by many as nothing but pirates, and stories abounded about

their unscrupulous practices, the most notorious being that some wreckers intentionally lured passing ships on to the reef with false lights so they could salvage the cargo. While many of the stories were probably true, wreckers, too, were often maligned, but in fact, provided a valuable service to the shipping industry.

## Wrecking Rules

lorida was the only state in the Union where the federal government required salvors to have a wrecking license. The licenses were issued by the U.S. Southern District of Florida, which was established by an act of Congress in 1847.

As with all government regulated enterprises, there were numerous rules. The first rule of wrecking was that no vessel could work in the wrecking business without having a license. Before being issued a license, the wrecker had to prove his vessel was seaworthy, that it was sufficiently equipped for salvage work, and that the master was trustworthy and "innocent" in dealings with previous ship-wrecked property.

#### A Typical Operation

First, there could hardly be any salvage operation that is viewed as typical, since most maritime endeavors are guided by Murphy's Law; that being: if anything can go wrong it will.

Officially, the salvage operation didn't begin until the captain of the vessel in distress gave the wrecker permission to save the ship. At that point, the salvor became the "wreck master." The wreck master directed the salvage operation.

In the case of more serious wrecks, where the vessel was in danger of sinking, or worse, being torn apart by storms, the vessels cargo was unloaded and carried to Key West, where an entire industry sprang up to handle its storage and disposition.

After reviewing some of the old court files, historian Love Dean chronicled several of the more interesting salvage operations in an article in Volume One of the Seafarers Journal of Marine Heritage. One of the largest involved the ship Issac Allerton, which sank in 30 feet of water after striking a reef during a hurri-

cane in

1856.

The salvage operation lasted six weeks and involved more than 400 people, twenty of whom were divers. Some of the cargo was recovered by wreckers who fished for boxes in the holds with a hook attached to a long pole, but the vast majority was retrieved by divers, who dove into the holds and attached lines to the boxes.

#### Wrecker's Rewards

The court determined who got what and the awards varied greatly.

The awards were based on a percentage of the property salvaged. In determining the value, the court took a variety of factors into account. In addition to the actual dollar value of the recovered goods, the court considered such intangible factors as the weather, the danger posed to the vessel, passengers and crew, the level of skill required to salvage the vessel, and the time it took to complete the operation.

In the case of the Issac Allerton, the value of the recovered cargo was estimated at \$96,000. In determining the wrecker's share, the court ordered all expenses related to the salvage costs

deducted off the top. The remaining \$43,852 was then divided by the wreckers, with sharesvarying from \$1 to \$769.

#### Renegade Wreckers

One of the most famous wreckers - and some say the most devious - was John Houseman, whose career began in the early 1820's.

Like many of Key West's early settlers, Houseman discovered the Keys when his ship ran aground here. The difference with Houseman was that the ship he arrived on had been "borrowed" without permission from his father. The wrecking trade was already a booming industry in Key West, and the romance and adventure of the salvage business no doubt appealed to the young New Yorker.

Houseman worked out of Key West for several years, but soon became tired of what he viewed as favortism by the courts toward local wreckers. In 1831 he purchased Indian Key, and moved his wrecking operation to the tiny island south of Lower Matecumbe.

He built streets, a town square, warehouses to store salvaged goods, a hotel, general store, and what may have been his most popular enterprise, a bar. Eventually, Houseman lobbied the territorial legislature to have Monroe County split, and in 1836, Indian Key was declared the seat of newly formed Dade County.

That same year, Houseman was caught stealing from one of the vessels he was salvaging. Two years later his wreckers license was revoked. Houseman continued to live on the island until August 7, 1840, when Indians attacked and burned the settlement.

Houseman and his wife managed to escape, but in the process lost most everything they owned. Finding work on another wrecker's vessel in Key West, Houseman's luck ran out the following year when he was crushed between two ships while trying to salvage a schooner that had run aground on the reef.

#### End of an Era

The wrecking industry began to dwindle in the late 1800's, when the government completed a string of lighthouses along the Keys to warn passing ships of dangerous shoals and reefs. As the number of shipwrecks declined, so too did the number of wreckers. The Keys last federally licensed salvage master, Capt. Chet Alexander, died in 1984.

Today, the wrecking tradition is carried on by a handful of modern salvage operators. Gone forever, though, are the days when news of a shipwreck was greeted with joy and the exciting cry of, "Wreck ashore!"

## Evangeline

Evangeline has recently returned from a month-long stay in Nashville where they recorded their second album to be titled French Quarter Moon. The album features many songs you've heard performed live for the last few months, such as "Just Like Elvis," "We Will Fly," "One More Day," "Begin With Goodbye," "On The Levee," and "Cross That Bridge." Along with these tunes are some great new songs they performed across the country last summer touring with Festival New Orleans. The album was co-produced by Justin Niebank and Michael Utley. Justin Niebank produced Evangeline's first album, and Michael Utley is the new VP of Margaritaville Records in Nashville. French Quarter Moon is scheduled for release in November.

In an article by Keith Spera in **Offbeat** magazine, Kathleen Stieffel says that, "We had a lot of songs on the first album we didn't choose. Not that they were bad selections, but I don't think it was quite as representative of the band as what the material on the second album is going to be."

"We want to be heavily involved in what goes on the album, and be very involved in every aspect of our career. We've learned a lot of lessons the hard way the first year. Just lately we have decided to take a lot of control back ourselves. We got a little too far away from what we were, and this is back to basics time for Evangeline."

Jimmy Buffett concurs, and wants the record to be "a little more honest to

what they want to do. The band, by being on the road with us, grew tremendously, and I think you take advantage of that experience. We're not trying to please somebody just to get the record on the radio. We did on the first one, and I make no apologies for it - it's part of the way to try and get something happening initially. But again, as we tried that, they were out working and developing their own audience on their own level. And that's working like a charm.

"Now they are out of the New Orleans market per se - they still have that, but they can go to Memphis and Florida and Atlanta and fill clubs - and that's where is starts. If they weren't going out and people were not coming and requesting songs, I'd think seriously about whether we'd work for them or not, but I see it happening and my confidence is totally there."

# ANKIE ANX

"Anguilla's Reggae Man" named for his birthplace in the British West Indies, is an internationally recognized reggae artist; performing throughout Europe, the U.S. and the Caribbean. His recent Key West performance at the Margaritaville Cafe. importing true island music to our island. typifies the rhythmical kaleidoscope he has created. Much as Key West is a blend of the U.S. and the Caribbean, Bankie Banx' music is also a curious blend. Elena Ourmano writes in The Beat: "Reggae's conventional themes of 'roots, Rasta, ganja' do not always accommodate Bankie Banx's expression. A superstar in West Indian circles, Banx has absorbed a wide range of musical and philosophical influences."

"Although heavily influenced by reggae superstar Bob Marley, he has been equally swayed by rockers Jimi Hendrix and Bob Dylan. Banx has a unique musical and performance style that has been described as electrifying and magical. His music is a blend of folk, rock, blues, jazz, pop, and reggae, creating a 'hybrid' uniquely his own." In an interview with The Virgin Islands Daily News, Bankie Banx said, "I first started as a top-40 bass player...I heard Jimmy Cliff and then Bob Marley and got sold on reggae." In 1981 he released his third album Soothe Your Soul, a tribute to Bob Marley.

In 1983 Banx and his Roots and Herbs band perform at Reggae Sunsplash Festival in Bob Marley Memorial Stadium, Jamaica; the first musicians from the Eastern Caribbean to take part in the festival. An appearance in the documentary Cool Runnings, a European tour with Jimmy Cliff, and a new album soon follow.

In 1990 Banx and associate Bob Seidenberg inaugurate Moonsplash, an annual international music festival held in the British, Dutch, and French West Indies.

Marie-Helene Goergler attended Moonsplash in 1992 and 1993, and reported to Reggae Report, The International Reggae Magazine.


