

Don't Stop The Carnival is the title of Pulitzer Prize winning author Herman Wouks' farce about oncoming middle age, and the desperate, doomed attempt of one man to arrest the sands of time. It is the humorous and often touching story of Norman Paperman, a middle-aged New York publicist, who decides to forego the rat race for a much sim-

pler life. Wouk and his family did just that for Jimmy spent many evenings honing his troubadour talents in Coconut Grove in the early 70's. His early story-telling, folk history insured him a spot in the hip clubs and coffee houses in Miami's answer to Greenwich Village. Jimmy's pre-Margaritaville to-do

list included the dream of one day performing on the stage of the Coconut Grove Playhouse. And always on his mind...Norman Paperman.





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

The 5th Annual Meeting Of The Minds held in New Orleans was an enormous success.



Dear Jimmy,


