



"With it's towers and balconies and wooden fretwork decorations it had the air at night of a Charles Addams house in a number of The New Yorker. You expected a witch to open the door to you or a maniac butler, with a bat dangling from a chandelier behind him. But in the sunlight, or when the lights went on among the palms, it seemed fragile and period and pretty and absurd, an illustration from a book of fairy tales."

Graham Greene's description of the fictional Hotel Trianon in his novel The Comedians holds true to this day. The actual locale is the Hotel Oloffson in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, and rather than a maniac butler, expect to run into singer/songwriter Manno Charlemagne, the current mayor of Port-au-Prince and, after a recent three year safety stint in Miami, permanent resident at the Oloffson. Daisann McLane writing in Rolling Stone Magazine, "The Oloffson, besides providing a refuge to the troubadour turned mayor, happens to be owned by Richard Morse, leader of RAM, one of a new wave of Haitian bands that is changing the cultural landscape of this struggling nation where politics, music and business intertwine in a tangle so complex, it's difficult to say where one ends and the other begins."

RAM's band leader, Richard Morse, who personifies the group's genesis and trajectory; is a third generation Haitian musician. His mother, Emerante de Pradine, is a well-known Haitian musician and dancer who has been recorded by the late Moses Asch's Folkways Recordings. His father is a retired Chairman of Latin American studies at Yale University. Following Richard's graduation from Princeton University, he played around the pop/funk club circuit, but the lure of his heritage from his mother proved compelling, so he moved to Haiti during the mid 80's. He began to trace the common African roots of American pop music via R&B and Haiti's Vodou rhythms in search of an honest synthesis.

Today RAM consists of over a dozen musicians and dancers drawn from the cream of Haiti's music scene, including three master drummers whose hand carved instruments speak from the soul of the countryside. RAM's music is electric and acoustic, drawing power and inspiration from parallel sources.

Director Jonathan Demme, has spent considerable time in Haiti and at the Oloffson, and kept the band in mind when his hit film Philadelphia was being scored. The platinum selling soundtrack CD included the tune Ibo Lele (Dreams Come True) from their first album Aibobo and gave the band their initial serious stateside and international exposure. RAM performed at the Bouyon Rasin (pronounced rah-SEEN) Music Festival in July, 1995, a celebration of Haiti's return to a somewhat even keel, and most recently at Haiti's Carnival in February of this year. Rasin is a roots music that weaves traditional Afro-Haitian vodou rhythms with slamming rock guitars and metaphor-laden political lyrics of struggle and spiritual redemption.

RAM's second album Puritan Vodou will be released on April 10, and will be available at the Margaritaville Store and through the Coconut Telegraph.


SEARCHIN LOSTSHAK

The Conch Flyer uses just the right amount of horseradish in their Bloody Mary's, This is the general consensus Thursday morning as we hop scotch our way from Key West to Miami to the Bahamas - three Margaritians in the throes of a decade long search for the lost

We arrive at the third world airport, survive the rigorous customs questionnaire, take a dusty late model Ford LTD taxi up and over the hill to the dock below where we're hustled onto a waiting watercraft - I'm being polite - skim across the bay and tumble into another Ford. All the while peeling off colorful Bahamian bills for the enthusiastic porters moving our luggage about. We're then ceremoniously deposited at what I'm told, and what certainly appears to be, an exclusive resort. We're golf carted to the cottage, reunited with our luggage and a cold Kalik, The Beer of the Bahamas. This process takes all of 20 minutes,

Henry Ford would be proud. We're on the beach with the sun still well above the horizon, toasting our sponsor, slowly sipping the darkened sugarcane juice [make a mental note to find some Havana Club]. We are indeed blessed.

On Friday we pedal across the entire 2 square miles of this craggy little key. Thankfully there's a minimum of "quaint funky charm." Most of this refuge has the personality of an old looked or best forgotten, but very comfortable to be around. We cruise the town's main marina where Jimmy lands his seaplane. Always cool to cruise the docks with a couple of wet ones...Kaliks I mean. It's a brief pump over the hill to Seagrapes, "Home of the Funk Gang". The Funk Gang are a popular group in the Bahamas who have performed in



the states, and Europe as well. You'll remember them dressed as Junkanoos parading Jimmy on stage during the '95 mini-tour. It's a Valentine Day extravaganza at Seagrapes. Seems like the entire town is out to see their home grown favorites. After dropping a couple of names, we pay the cover charge and head upstairs.

We trade rounds with local artist and Kalik connoisseur Frank Mather. The island ambiance defines his water colors, the lined illustrations casually framing the Caribbean pastels, just as the Seagrapes ambiance defines his mood; his generosity is surpassed only by his artistic ability. By 2AM we're staggering home, dodging golf carts and well-wishers we respectfully pass the cemetery and vow to start taking better care of ourselves - right after one more beer on the beach.

We went to Gusty's Bar on a low tide kinda' Saturday night. Strolling along Bay Street with the potcakes, Bahamian dogs owned by everyone and no one, and trudging our way up the 45 degree hill to the sandy floored saloon with arguably the best view on the island. ATTY BY RESER


"The days drift by, they don't have names. There are so many quiet places. And

Gus used to work at the marina where Jimmy lands the seaplane. They became acquainted when Jimmy nearly murdered him trying to dislodge the front landing gear stuck in the dock. "What the &%#@* are you doing!" Gus shouted. Later inside Jimmy offered to buy him a beer, apologized for frightening him and an ongoing friendship began.

Several years later he left the marina, bought this Caribbean castle and named it after his son. Shoes off, feet up on the plastic lawn furniture, we're joined by Gus and more Kalik. "Jimmy sits here, right at this table when he writes; papers stacked up this high, all over the table. I asked him once about a song he wrote called "One Particular Harbour", 'Is this the harbour you were thinking of?' 'Don't worry about it Gus,' he said. I think that was his way of blowing me off."

Jimmy has known Gus for nearly 10 years. They've spent time on the water, "he knows



where all the bonefish are in this harbour," in the air, "I flew with him to Nassau once for a bucket of KFC," and behind the bar. "My wife and I came home late one night, and found him standing behind the bar. "What can I get for you guys?" Jimmy asked. "How the hell did you get in here?" Gus said reaching for a beer. A framed article and photo from **Travel & Leisure Magazine** is displayed behind the bar. The photo is of Jimmy working the room in the spring of '91. Not much has changed over the past 6 years. That, of course, is the appeal.

More Buffett lore accompanied each bottle of Kalik, until we were thankfully joined by Gus' four-year old little boy, Gannon. Jimmy Buffett's godson charmed us with his sing-song island patois, and his acappela rendi-

tion of "I Believe I Can Fly", sung - whispered so sweetly it gripped my heart like a sponge. My eyes stung from looking directly at the setting sun fade away and finally disappear. This place was getting to me.

Others have written of their experiences; a couple in Cane Garden Bay, a woman going to Domino College in Nevis, and even the guy who traveled all the way to Key West to visit the Islander Drive-In. So now I went "down island." Not on a mission, not on a quest, just to spend a long weekend with a couple of friends. And here we find the people and places Jimmy writes and sings about, here we find the laidback attitude and manana mentality necessary to survive. It's tough to travel through this part of the world and not find someone touched, directly or indirectly, by Jimmy Buffett music.

Back in Key West I decide our trip could be interesting enough for The Coconut Telegraph. To share an island experience, to share a couple of Jimmy stories, to share the hospitality we received. They're right, it is better in the Bahamas.

None of the streets here look the same: smilin' eyes match the smilin' faces."

1997 YACHTING KEY WEST RACE WEEK





JANUARY WAS A BUSY SAILING MONTH IN KEY WEST. THE MIDWINTER REGATTA, NORMALLY HELD IN MIAMI, MADE A 20-YEAR ANNIVERSARY RETURN TO KEY WEST. THESE WERE THE SLICK J/24 CLASS BOATS, OF WHICH OVER 100 PARTICIPATED. ANOTHER CLASS OF SAILBOAT, THE HEAVYWEIGHT CLASS, THE CREAM OF THE CROP, THE TOP OF THE SAILING WORLD, THE IMS2 CLASS COMPETED. ONE OF THE COMPETITORS WAS OUR OWN ROSS RITTO, JIMMY'S SOUNDMAN AND STUDIO ENGINEER.

ROSS' SAILING HISTORY GOES BACK TO ROCHESTER, NY. AND SKIRTING ACROSS LAKE ONTARIO. ROSS BEGAN SAILING AT 14, INITIALLY CRUISING, AND THEN FOLLOWED THE COMPETITIVE TACK INTO RACING. HIS EARLY RACING WAS DONE IN A SUNFISH, STILL THE EASIEST BOAT TO LEARN THE ART OF SAILING.

IN 1976 JIMMY WAS THE OPENING ACT FOR THE EAGLES. ROSS JOINED THE TOUR THAT SUMMER AND HAS BEEN ASSOCIATED WITH JIMMY EVER SINCE. JIMMY'S LOVE OF SAILING WAS OBVIOUS AND THIS REKINDLED THE SAILING BUG IN ROSS. "JIMMY HAD THE BIG CRUISER AT THAT TIME, THE EUPHORIA II, I BELIEVE, AND I BEGAN TO THINK ABOUT GETTING BACK INTO SAILING."

ROSS WENT BACK TO NEW YORK AND BOUGHT A CRUISER, AN ISLAND TRADER 41FOOT KETCH. HE BEGAN A NINE-MONTH CRUISE ALONG THE EAST COAST, THROUGH
THE BAHAMAS AND INTO THE CARIBBEAN. "THE CRUISE WASN'T ALL AT ONCE," HE
TOLD ME ON THE PHONE. "JIMMY WAS TOURING MORE AT THAT TIME, SO WE WOULD
DOCK SOMEWHERE, FLY OVER TO TOUR WITH THE BAND FOR AWHILE, THEN RESUME
OUR CRUISE." MY ENVIOUS "OH MAN" SIGH WAS AUDIBLE, AND TALKING ABOUT IT
SEEMED TO HAVE SENT ROSS ON A QUICK NOSTALGIA TRIP OF HIS OWN, "IT WAS
REALLY A GREAT TIME. THE BAHAMAS ARE FUN TO SAIL AROUND. LOT OF GREAT
PLACES TO ANCHOR."

ROSS MOVED TO CALIFORNIA IN THE 80'S, STARTED A VERY SUCCESSFUL BUSINESS, **SOUND IMAGE**, AND AFTER A FEW YEARS BEGAN TO THINK ABOUT GETTING BACK INTO SAILING - AGAIN. "THERE'S NO PLACE TO CRUISE IN CALIFORNIA, NOT LIKE THE CARIBBEAN ANYWAY, SO I DECIDED TO GET BACK INTO RACING." ROSS OWNS THE HIGH 5, WHICH HE UNABASHEDLY CLAIMS IS THE "HOT BOAT" IN SAN DIEGO. "WE RACE A LOT IN SAN DIEGO, AND WE DO WELL."

BUT THE BIG DADDY OF THE IMS2 RACING CIRCUIT IS THE KEY WEST RACE, SO ROSS BROUGHT THE 40-FOOT HIGH 5 AND CREW OF TEN TO COMPETE. "WE'D RACED IN A PHRF AMATEUR RACE IN KEY WEST IN 1990, PLACING 2ND IN OUR CLASS, PLUS I WAS FAMILIAR ENOUGH WITH THE AREA TO THINK WE HAD A CHANCE."

THE HIGH 5 WAS THE OLDEST BOAT IN ITS CLASS, RATED THE SLOWEST, AND VAL-UED AT SUBSTANTIALLY LESS THAN THE MILLION DOLLAR BOATS IT HAD TO COMPETE AGAINST. THE COMPETENT CREW INCLUDING WALT DISNEY'S NEPHEW AND A 1982 GOLD MEDALIST AT THE HELM PLACED THE HIGH 5 FOURTH OVERALL IN ITS CLASS.

ON A HUMOROUS NOTE, WHILE STAYING AT JIMMY'S HOUSE CREW MEMBER JIMMY SLAUGHTER ANSWERED THE PHONE WHEN JIMMY BUFFETT CALLED AND BEGAN A "WHO'S ON FIRST" CONVERSATION THAT ENDED WITH "I OWN THAT DAMN PLACE," OR SOMETHING TO THAT AFFECT. I'M TOLD THAT THE SITUATION WAS AMICABLY RESOLVED.

ON A SAD NOTE ROSS RITTO HAS RETIRED FROM THE ROAD. JIMMY DRAGGED ROSS KICKING AND SCREAMING FROM THE SOUND BOARD ON STAGE IN ORLANDO TO PUBLICLY THANK HIM FOR THE LAST TWENTY YEARS. SOUND IMAGE, WILL STILL PROVIDE THE EQUIPMENT AND CREW FOR THE TOUR, BUT ROSS WILL STAY AT HOME, WORKING HARDER BUT SLEEPING BETTER.

Parrot Heads in Richmond, VA. have "adopted" an Il year old girl. Katherine was born deaf, but would read Jimmy and daughter Savannah Jane's childens books and "listen" to Jimmy's music by hugging the speakers and feeling the vibrations. Several months ago she was fortunate enough to have cochlear implants surgically placed in her ears, and she can now hear Jimmy Buffett for the first time.

Katherine served as the Grand Marshall on a 48-foot Christmas Island float sponsored by Parrot Heads in her city's annual Christmas parade. 
